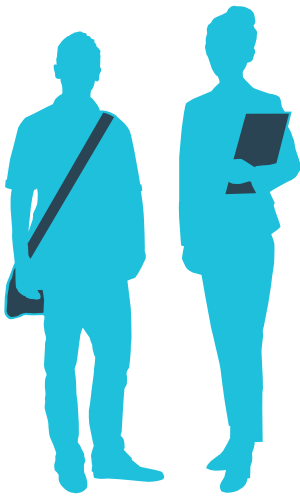
Ballot Issue 5C and Amendment 73 Funding Proposal

HIGH SCHOOL PRIORITIZED INVESTMENTS

(Aligns with the district's new strategic plan - ELEVATE.)



DIVERSE LEARNING

Decrease class sizes.

Increase learning opportunities for all students including Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM), Career and Technical Education (CTE), Advanced Placement (AP), etc.

Increase support for specialized populations (e.g. emerging bilinguals, special education, gifted and talented).



OUTSIDE-THE-CLASSROOM LEARNING

Improve outside-the-classroom learning opportunities.



SOCIAL-EMOTIONAL LEARNING

Invest in additional staff to provide more individualized attention to students.



21ST CENTURY LEARNERS

Enhance critical-thinking and problem-solving skills through inquiry-based lessons and resources across all programs.

Improve and embed technology into learning.

Bring textbooks and learning materials up-to-date to meet new and more rigorous academic standards.



WORLD-CLASS STAFF

Increase new teacher starting salary to be competitive with neighboring districts.

Implement cost-of-living adjustment for all employee groups.

Support teachers with updated resources and instructional materials.



SAFE SCHOOLS

Add members to the district crisis response team that supports all schools.

Increase security on school campuses.
